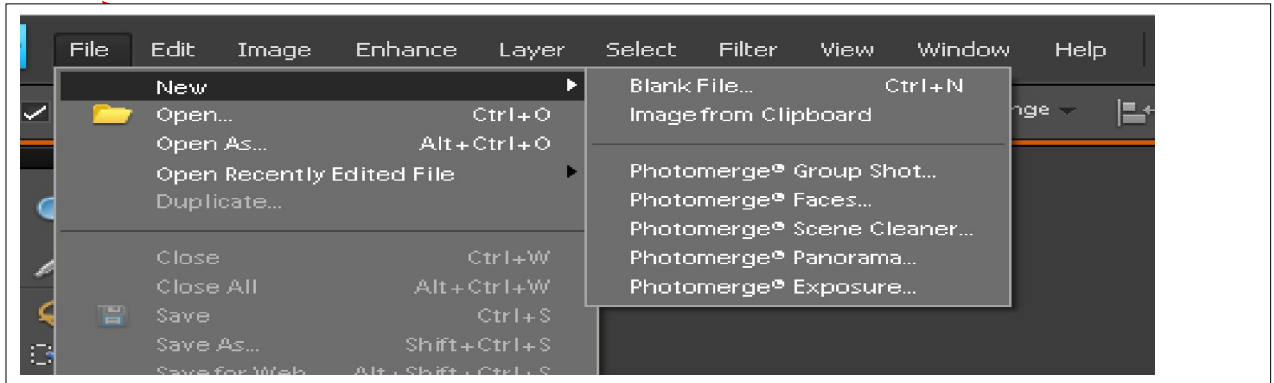
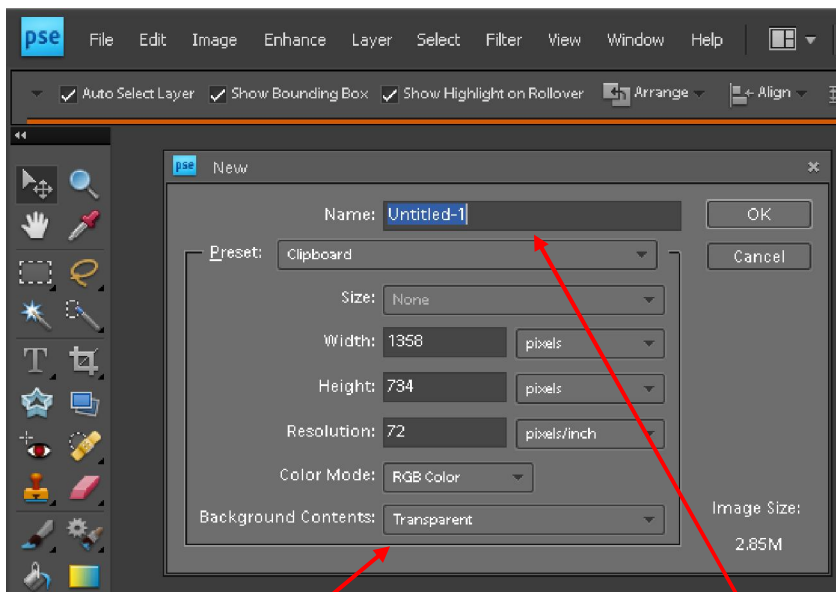


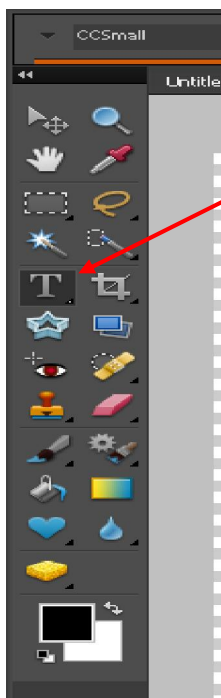
Creating a Custom “Copyright” Brush



1. Open your PS Elements and in the “File” Column click on “New” then “Blank File”



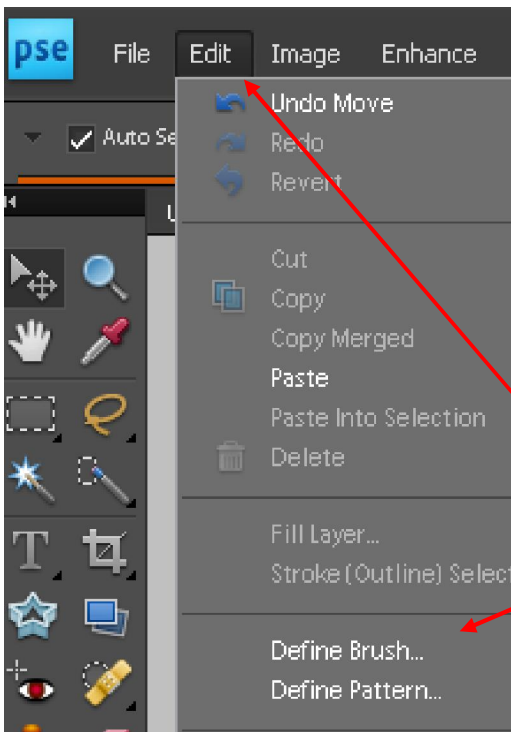
2. When the “New” dialog box comes up, type a name for your watermark brush and be sure to set the background to “Transparent”. Leave the rest of the settings as they are.



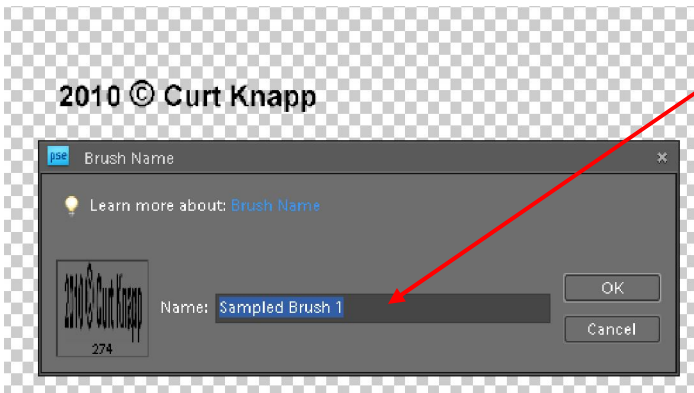
3. Select the “Text” tool

Type your Watermark, to get a COPYRIGHT symbol, hold down the “ALT” key on your keyboard while typing “0169” on the numeral keypad. When you release the “Alt” key the symbol will appear.

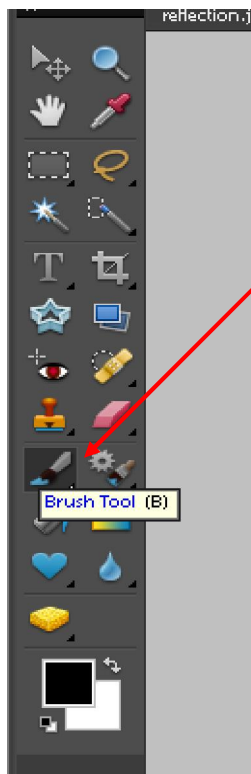
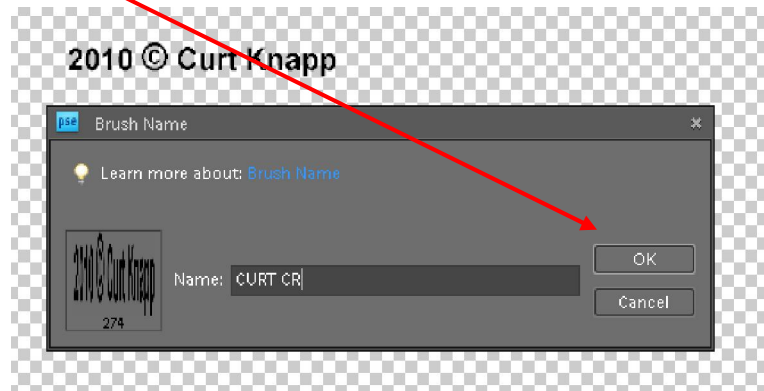




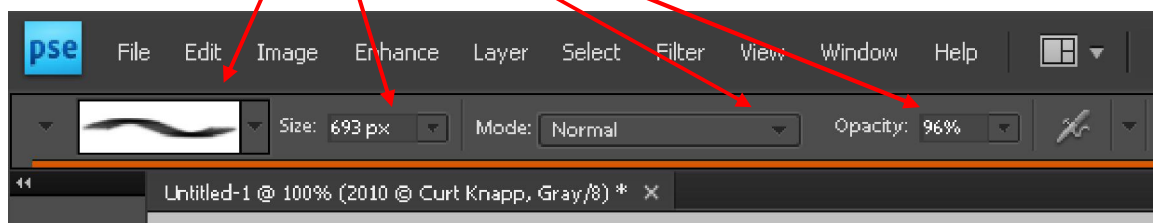
4. Now you need to select the “Define Brush” Command in the “Edit” column

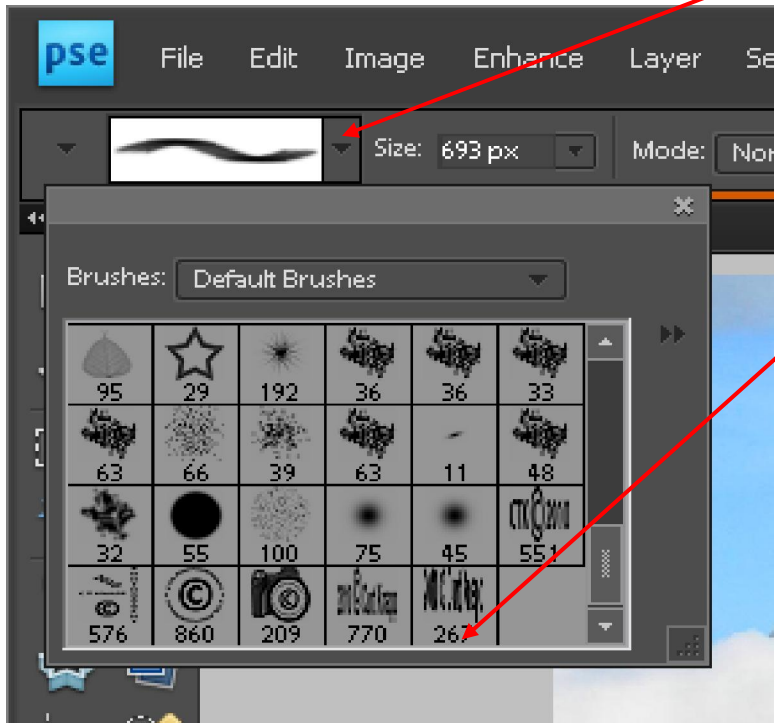


5. Type a new name for your “Watermark” and click “OK”



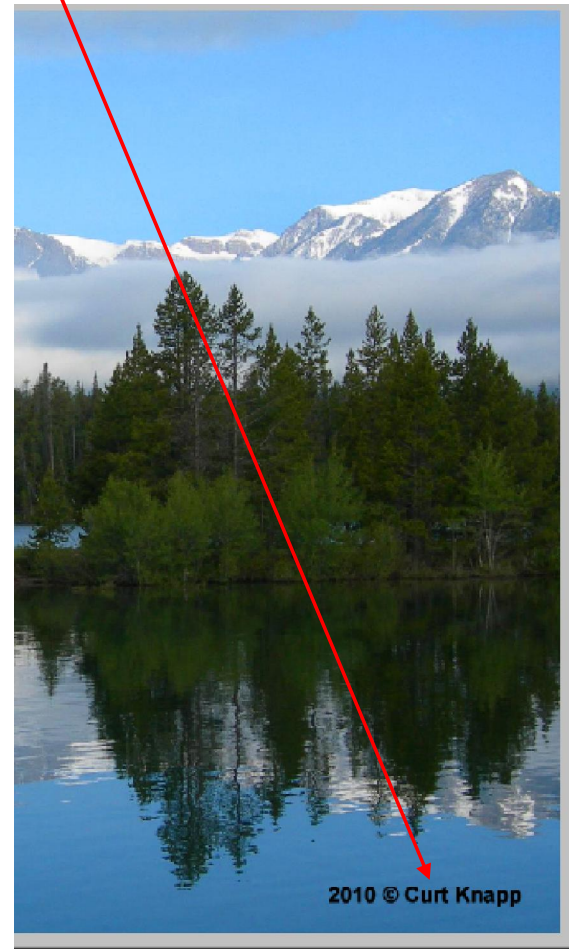
6A. To select your new Brush click on the “Brush” tool icon. Once you have selected the “Brush” tool the command line at the top of the screen should show the “brush” tool options.





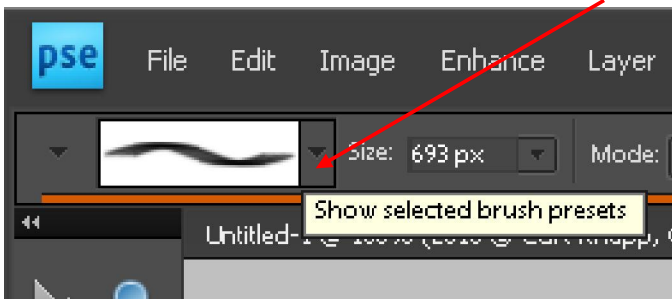
6B. Click on the “brush” selection and scroll down to the bottom last brush icon and this will be your new brush (your Watermark)

6C. To use your Watermark brush just click on it to select it and then place your brush on a picture and click your mouse.

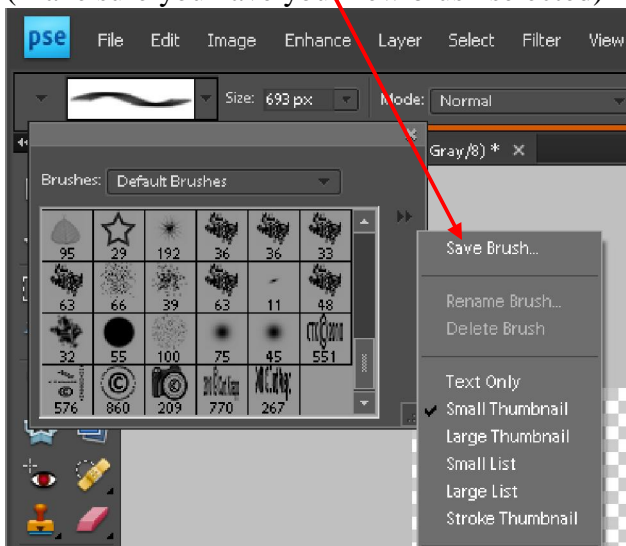


7. Rember to save your brush, if you have to reload your brush selections - your new brush will not be there so save it as follows.

A. With the brush tool selected click on the “Brush presets”



B. Click on “Save Brush”
(Make sure you have your new brush selected)



C. When the “Brush Name” dialog box comes up, click “OK”
